

- Ireland and UK
- Denmark and Sweden
- Portugal, France and Spain
- FU Berlin: Germany, Austria and others
- Coordination via EUMETNET?





UK and Ireland Pilot Project: 'Name Our Storms'



- Reach and engagement for warnings
- Authoritative Voice (more on this later!)
- Single name
- Aids comms: New media, 'hashtag culture'
- Opportunity for Collaboration
- Shared risk, language, media
- Useful post-event for reference



'Name Our Storms' – How it Works



- Based on warnings
- Meteoalarm framework (AMBER/ORANGE or above) – ie. impact-based
- NMS which first issues the warning gets to name, then agreement to use that name
- Names used public suggestions
- Initially wind only, but other factors now considered in addition to wind.













55% of people surveyed changed their behaviour in some way upon hearing about a named storm.




















Graph showing 2016/17 Storm Season media reach
